FROM THE DESK OF MAYOR SERGIO RODRIGUEZ

You've probably noticed several projects happening around town. IDOT has been busy **resurfacing Archer Ave. and 1st Ave.** Additionally, the lead line replacement project is nearing completion on the north side of the Village and will soon begin on the south side. Although **the Archer Ave. bridge repair project** has been delayed, work is expected to begin in mid-September. Finally, we've started lining the sewer lines on the west side of the Village, which will help extend the life of our sewer system for years to come.

We understand that the **storm** on July 25th caused significant damage to many homes and properties due to an unprecedented 8.9 inches of rain falling in a very short period of time. The Village of Summit has a combined sewer system, which means our home wastewater and stormwater runoff share a single pipe. The ideal solution to prevent future flooding is to separate these systems, but this is an extremely costly project. Despite this, please know we have spoken with state and federal officials, including the MWRD, to raise our concerns about this ongoing issue, will continue to apply for funding and keep advocating for our community's needs. Although the state has issued a Natural Disaster Proclamation to trigger potential federal aid, it is undetermined at this time whether Illinois and Cook County will qualify for assistance.

In the meantime, the Village is committed to regular maintenance of our existing sewer lines. This summer alone, we have **televised and jet-cleaned the sewer lines** to ensure they are clear and functioning as well as possible. We will continue to advocate for our community and keep you updated on our progress.

PARK DISTRICT EXPLORES GLOBAL CULTURE THROUGH FOOD AND BOOKS

This past summer, **the Summit Park District** was the place where young taste buds gathered to explore the flavors and traditions of global cuisine during "Food Around the World," a free culinary program for kids led by local culinary arts instructor Chef Violeta Trujeque, owner of Violet Velvet Cooking Classes.

This engaging program invited children to travel the world through food. Participants learned how to prepare simple recipes from different continents — all while discovering the cultural stories behind each dish. [See **LIBRARIES**, Page 5].

With school back in session, we urge all drivers to exercise extra caution—especially during morning drop-off and afternoon dismissal hours. Please watch carefully for children crossing the streets and be extra cautious around school buses that are picking up or dropping off students.

A reminder to all students, parents, and visitors: school zone parking enforcement has resumed following the summer break. This applies to the area from **62nd Street to 64th Place, between Harlem Avenue and Archer Road**. Please observe posted signs and avoid parking violations to keep our streets safe for children.

Unfortunately, the planned Citizens Police Academy has been **suspended** due to low enrollment. We are committed to educating our residents about this valuable program and hope to re-launch it in the future with greater participation.

Several **ongoing construction projects** are impacting local traffic patterns throughout the Village. Expect **increased con-**

gestion during rush hours and more vehicles using residential streets as detours. In response, new **one-way street designations** have been implemented and may help ease some of the anticipated traffic issues. We appreciate your patience and cooperation during this time.

Fall is right around the corner as our nights become cooler and our days become shorter. Public Works will continue to patch potholes, clean out sewers, and maintain our parkways. Grass cutting, street light maintenance, street sweeping, and alley grading will also continue throughout the fall.

FALL CLEANLINESS

Please be a good neighbor and clean up after your pet. Cleaning up after dogs is very important and continues to be an issue. Additionally, maintenance is a good way to keep rodents from coming back. The Village has a pest control company that sets baits in the public alley.



YARD WASTE

Yard waste will continue to be picked up until **Saturday, November 28**. Please make sure to place your yard waste in appropriate containers not to be bigger than a 30 gallon container and 50lbs.

Do not rake or blow the leaves into the streets or sewers. This has been an issue this summer and becomes a problem when it rains. **Residents caught raking or blowing them into the streets will be fined.**


Please be aware that if paper **recycling bags** are being used keep the weight and moisture at a limit so bags won't rip. Branches must be cut down to 3 feet and tied together in bushels for pickup. Yard waste, as well as garbage pickup, should be out by 6:00 a.m. on Fridays, preferably on Thursday night.

WEATHER REMINDERS

The recent down pour of rain have caused overgrown weeds and debris on properties. Code enforcement will be out giving warnings and citations for overgrown grass and weeds as well as any harborage that would attract rodents.

We ask you to please be mindful of the signs posted through the community regarding **parking**, especially as we approach colder months. To have efficient and safe plowing parking should be as close to the curb as possible.

Weather proofing your home for the upcoming colder months is highly recommended to prevent drafts, as well as pipes from freezing. A few ways to prevent freezing pipes is to insulate the pipes, keep the heat on, have the faucet drip slightly, keep cabinets open and — if they do happen to freeze — use a blow dryer to unfreeze. **Never use fire to unfreeze a pipe.**

Fall is here. The air is crisp, the leaves are changing, and pumpkin spice has somehow found its way into everything. On top of that, school is back in session — so watch your speed in school zones, stop for buses, and remember kids can dart out between cars without you knowing it.

Here are a few safety tips to keep this season cozy instead of chaotic:

LEAF PILES ARE NOT FIRE PITS

Burning leaves might feel old-school, but flames can spread faster than bad karaoke at a block party. Dispose of them properly or let the kids jump in them—after checking for rakes, rocks, and the neighbor's cat.

CANDLE SEASON = CAUTION SEASON

That apple-cinnamon candle smells amazing, but keep it away from curtains, furniture, and anything flammable. Never leave a candle burning unattended—no matter how “Instagram-worthy” the vibe is.

SPACE HEATERS NEED SPACE

They're not footrests, tables, or cat warmers. Keep three feet of clearance and plug them directly into the wall—never an extension cord.

ILLINOIS SMOKE DETECTOR LAW

All new smoke detectors in Illinois must have a **10-year sealed battery**. If yours still takes a 9-volt, now's the perfect time to upgrade. That's one less thing to forget—and one less “beep” waking you up at 2 a.m.

LITHIUM BATTERY CHARGING SAFETY

Phones, e-bikes, scooters—if it has a rechargeable lithium battery, use the charger it came with, never charge it on your bed or couch, and don't leave it plugged in overnight. These batteries can overheat quickly.

HOME FURNACE SAFETY CHECKS

As temperatures drop, many of us will be firing up our home heating systems. Before you turn on your furnace for the first time this season, take these precautionary steps:

- **Professional Inspection:** Schedule a professional inspection of your furnace. This will ensure that your heating system is in good working order and free from potential hazards like gas leaks or carbon monoxide buildup.
- **Change Filters:** Replace the furnace filters to keep the air clean and help your furnace run efficiently.
- **Clear the Area:** Ensure that the area around your furnace is clear of any flammable materials. This includes paper, rags, and cleaning supplies.
- **Check Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors:** Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace the batteries if needed. These devices are critical for early detection of fires and carbon monoxide leaks.

BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS

With children back in school, it's important to reinforce safety both at home and on the road:

- **Road Safety:** Remind children to look both ways before crossing the street and to always use crosswalks. Drivers, please slow down and be extra cautious in school zones and residential areas.
- **Bus Safety:** Teach children to stand back from the curb while waiting for the bus and to stay seated while the bus is moving. Make sure they understand the importance of following the bus driver's instructions.
- **Home Safety:** If your children are staying home alone after school, review fire safety protocols with them. Make sure they know how to use the stove safely, what to do in case of an emergency, and whom to call if needed.

The organization, founded by Summit native and Argo alumna **Caroline Sanchez Crozier**, seeks to inform and empower through bilingual workshops and mentorship programs that build digital skills, confidence, and community connection. These programs—offered for youth, adults, and seniors—are made possible through Cook County’s Digital Equity IMPACT small grants program, launched in 2024 to support local storytelling and digital inclusion.

“As part of the Cook County IMPACT grant, we’re focused on storytelling and providing tools our community can use to thrive,” said **DLN Communications Strategist Leda Sanchez**. “We’re excited to partner with the Village of Summit as we advance digital equity in this great community.”

Founded in 2019, Digital Leaders Now (DLN) centers its mission around three pillars: Education (STEM and digital literacy), Community (bilingual access and local partnerships), and Industry (career exposure and collaboration). The organization previously worked with the Village of Summit to support broadband advocacy and continues to lead efforts to close the digital divide. In August, DLN hosted its Smart Tools for School Success workshop at the Summit Park District, helping families explore tools like Word, Google Docs, and Canva—designed to support students’

learning and confidence with everyday tech.


