Just dial 999.** The IDOT Minuteman was there in literally 5 minutes and was able to change my flat tire and get me on my way in under 2 minutes! As always remember to slow down and yield to the right when you see emergency vehicles on the road for the safety of all parties. I would like to thank my IDOT Minuteman for coming out and saving the day. **Scott's Law requires drivers to slow down and move over one lane, if possible, when approaching a stopped emergency vehicle, or any vehicle with flashing lights. Let's be safe and keep our eyes on the road.**

## SUMMIT 'NEVER FORGETS' 9/11

A brief ceremony recalling the unfortunate terrorist attacks 18 years ago started at 9:11 am Wednesday, September 11<sup>TH</sup> in front of Summit's Joseph Kurcz Memorial Firehouse on 59<sup>TH</sup> Street.

Addressing those who had gathered, **Summit Fire Chief Wayne Hanson** said "People are still dying from this incident. First responders, police and fire, the public who worked at Ground Zero... This was a day that changed our world forever. It's changed the way we live our lives. Many innocent men, women and children were killed that day, and we are here today to never forget."

After placing a floral wreath at the flagpole, **Deputy Fire Chief Frank Batura** said, "It's up to us to remember with ceremonies like this - to instill in future generations that regardless of how we are attacked we still are the greatest country in the world."

**Micah Windle**, pastor of the Summit Bible Church, and fire department chaplain said a prayer "for the peace in our hearts to prevail over all the tragedy that happens in this world."



The Police and Fire Station, originally built in 1945, now houses the Police Department and Council Chambers. The Fire Department has since moved out of the building.

## Wayne Hanson Fire Chief



As Summer turns to Fall, the members of the SFD would like to refresh your memory on some **Fall safety tips** to keep you and your family members safe!

### SERVICE YOUR FURNACE

Many things can go wrong with heating equipment during the spring and summer months. **Before the cold autumn and winter weather sets in**, be sure to call your heating and cooling company to service your furnace. A specialist should inspect the furnace to make sure everything is in working order and that there are no leaks. **If you have a gas heater:** make sure that you have a sufficient quantity of fully functioning carbon monoxide detectors installed in your home. **If you've got a fireplace:** keep that fire in its proper place by using a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying out of the fireplace. Never leave a burning fire unattended, and make sure a fire in a fireplace is completely out before going to bed. Hire a professional chimney sweep to inspect and clean your chimney. Keep flammable objects at least three feet away from the fireplace.

### DECORATE SAFELY

Can't wait to decorate your home and mastermind scary costumes for Halloween? **Remember that Halloween safety comes first.** Keep decorations away from open flames and other heat sources, and use battery-operated lights instead of candles in jack-o-lanterns. **Use only fire retardant holiday decorations**, and verify that all holiday lights and extension cords have been tested by a recognized safety organization.

### OUTDOOR TIPS

As leaves and other flammable debris build up around your home, make it a habit to remove them periodically. Prune trees and rake up leaves and twigs. **Don't store fuel in your home or garage.** Keep your roof, gutters, and downspouts clear of debris and re-

move fuel from lawn mowers before storing them for winter. **Remember; burning leaves is against the law and can be harmful to your health.**


**Never park your car or truck over a pile of leaves.** The heat from the vehicle's catalytic converter or exhaust system can ignite the leaves below. The resulting fire could destroy your vehicle. **Don't store cardboard boxes, paper or other flammable materials in the backyard.** These materials provide ready fuel for a fire and all it takes is one spark.

By keeping these important fall safety tips in mind, you can be sure you are doing everything you can to protect yourself and your family from seasonal dangers. **This will leave your mind free to enjoy the beauty of this glorious season.**

**Don't forget to change the batteries of your smoke detector when you change your clocks November 3<sup>RD</sup>.** Smoke alarms are key components for safety. Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, and on every level of the home.

Finally, we are happy to report that the SFD will be receiving an early Christmas present with the delivery of **a brand new Fire Engine!** Stay tuned, and look for pictures in our next newsletter.



## Bill Mundy Public Works Director

Fall is here and the Village is preparing for the months to come. Public Works has been patching potholes, cleaning out sewers, taking care of parkways, and dealing with water main breaks. Grass cutting, street light maintenance, street sweeping, and alley grading will all continue throughout the fall. **Please report any streetlight outages or missing signs to 708-563-4809.**



Yard waste will continue to be **picked up until Friday, November 29<sup>TH</sup>**. Please make sure to place your yard waste in appropriate containers not to be bigger than a 32-gallon container and 50lbs. **Do not rake leaves into the streets or sewers, as it will become a problem with the rain.** Residents caught raking/blowing leaves into the streets will be fined. Also be aware that if paper recycling bags are being used, keep the weight and moisture at a limit so bags won't rip. Branches must be cut down to 3 feet and tied together in bushels for pickup. Yard waste as well as garbage pickup **should be out by 6:00 am on Fridays - preferably on Thursday night.**

This year as you may have noticed more trees have come down. **On 63<sup>RD</sup> Street with the beautification project, trees taken down were due to trees being unhealthy or have had a failure to thrive. Trees taken down on 63<sup>RD</sup> Street will be replaced.**

The residential area will also be affected. The Village has had a Comprehensive Parkway Tree Condition Survey that identifies trees that are hazardous, dead, or declining based on recommended Arboriculture standards. **The Village will be launching a new tree program in the coming months** that will be replacing trees that have come down or will need to come down. We have also been given a replacement tree list of recommended trees that are parkway friendly. It is very important for the Village to replace these trees so that we can help our environment with the absorption of water, pollutants and carbon dioxide.

As the cold months approach, we ask you to please be mindful of the signs posted through the community regarding parking. To have efficient and safe plowing, **parking should be as close to the curb as possible.** Also, please be aware of any fire hydrants that may get buried due to snow or plowing. Please help keep them clean and visible for our fire department. Our plow operators are instructed to work with our residents, and **during heavy snowfall, our main objective is to clear streets for emergency vehicles and the motoring public.**

Residents should also prepare their homes from the cold winter months. **Weather proofing your home is highly recommended** to prevent drafts as well as pipes freezing. A few ways to prevent freezing pipes is to insulate the pipes, **...CONTINUED ON PAGE 5...**

**The Village will continue with the 50/50 program next year.** We have already started to take names and numbers. Any resident who has signed up for the program will be contacted in the coming year with more information.



## **HAVE YOU HEARD OF LIHEAP WINTER ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM?** **ONLY 7.5% OF THE 2,942 ELIGIBLE SUMMIT RESIDENTS APPLIED LAST YEAR**

Starting this month, the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity will begin scheduling appointments and accepting applications for **winter heating assistance for seniors and people with disabilities** through the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).



LIHEAP is a state and federally funded energy assistance program for low-income families, in which heating bill payments are made on behalf of households. Benefits are paid directly to energy vendors on behalf of eligible households. The exception is households whose heating costs are included in their rent.

**LIHEAP applicants will be served on a first-come, first-served basis until May 31, 2020 or until funding is exhausted.**

Customers must bring all required documentation when applying for assistance including:

- \***Proof of gross income** from all household members for the 30-day income period beginning with the date of the application.
- \***A copy of their current heat and electric bills** issued within the last 30 days (if they pay for their energy directly).
- \***A copy of their rental agreement** (if they are renting) showing that utilities are included, the monthly rental amount and landlord contact information.
- \***Proof of Social Security** numbers for all household members.
- \***Proof that their household received** Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF); Aid to the Aged, Blind, or Disabled (AABD); or other benefits, such as Medical Eligibility or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), if receiving assistance from the Illinois Department of Human Services.

The Cook County Treasurer's Office has reduced the number of properties with incorrect names and mailing addresses by nearly a third, but there are still many Cook County residents that have their bills returned due to incorrect information. We encourage you to take a few minutes and visit [www.cookcountytreasurer.com](http://www.cookcountytreasurer.com) to update your name and mailing address on your tax bills. The website shows when tax bills have been returned by the U.S. Postal Service.

To see if your bills have been returned or to change the name and address on your bill, visit [www.cookcountytreasurer.com](http://www.cookcountytreasurer.com) and:

- \* Select the **purple box** labeled "Your Property Tax Overview"
- \* Enter your address or Property Index Number (PIN).
- \* Look for a **red warning box** that appears if your bills have been returned.
- \* Select "Update Your Information" to change the taxpayer name or mailing address.

**To avoid the hassle of the mail, select "eBilling" on the website to receive your tax bill by email.** Paper name/address change applications will always be accepted.
